

English for Nurses: Discussing Pain

ab domen	Medical term for <i>belly</i> or <i>tummy</i> . The front part of the body between the thorax and the pelvis.
(to) ache	to have a pain which is dull and constant
aches and pains	collocation meaning pains in general, e.g. I have suffered from aches and pains in my knees for several years.
a cro mion	medical term for the highest point of the shoulder blade
acute	describes pain which is sharp and usually short-term
anal ge sia	medical term for <i>pain relief</i> or <i>painkiller</i>
an kle	hinge joint between the tibia and fibula of the foot and the talus (ankle bone)
ante cu bital foss a	medical term meaning <i>crook of the elbow;</i> area on the inside of the elbow where blood samples may be taken from
(to) assess	to evaluate something
back in jury	damage to the bones, tissues or muscles of the back.
bel ly	see abdomen
bone	tough material which supports the body and protects soft organs
(to) bore	to make a hole in something, e.g. bore a hole into the cranium
boring (pain)	pain which feels as if someone is making a hole into the body
buttocks	two rounded parts of the anatomy below the sacrum, generally meaning the fat over the gluteal muscles. Also called <i>bottom</i> , <i>bum</i> (<i>vulgar</i>) or <i>butt</i> (<i>vulgar</i>).
canthus	Medical term meaning <i>corner of the eye</i> . The angular junction between the upper and lower eyelids.
capsule	medication enclosed in a soft cover that is taken by mouth
cartilage	tough, fibrous connective tissue which connects bones
chest	medical term thorax/thorac-; area of the body between the neck and the abdomen including the organs (heart and lungs) which are protected by the ribcage
chro nic	describes something which is long-term
comfortable	free from pain or discomfort
confusion	disoriented mental state, lack of awareness of time and place
consti pa tion	intestinal disorder causing the passing of hard stool or no stool at all





crook of the elbow	see antecubital fossa
crushing	describes a feeling of having a heavy weight pressing down
cu bicle	section in an Emergency Department which has curtains around it for privacy
de men tia	disorder which causes the loss of mental function and causes an inability to manage daily activities
di ary	personal record kept by a patient to monitor a disease or disorder, e.g. a diabetes diary
dull ache	a pain which is not sharp or intense, but tends to be constant
drowsiness	feeling of tiredness
earache	medical term otodynia, often caused by an infection
Emergency Department (ED)	area of the hospital which is equipped for emergency care, e.g. trauma
epi gas tric	medical term meaning above the stomach, e.g. epigastric pain
ext er ior	meaning outside or external
fe mur	Medical term meaning <i>thigh bone</i> . The femur is the longest bone in the body extending from the pelvis to the knee.
fore head	part of the face between the eyebrows and the hair of the scalp
gait	the way a person walks, e.g. shuffling gait
gluteal	medical term meaning relating to the gluteus muscles or buttocks
hand over	communication of patient information from one healthcare professional to another, e.g. during the transfer of patients from one part of the hospital to another
head ache	pain in any part of the head
heat pack	heated pad which is used to soothe painful areas, especially muscular pain
heel	the back part of the foot
(to) hurt	to be painful or sore
hypo chon driac	person who is abnormally worried about their health
hypo gas tric	medical term meaning below the abdomen, e.g. hypogastric region
iliac	medical term relating to the ilium (pelvis bone)
in cis ion	surgical cut into the body, often before a surgical procedure





indi ge stion	general term for gastrointestinal symptoms such as heartburn, nausea, bloating and a feeling of fullness
inflam ma tion	tissue response to injury which results in redness and swelling around the area of injury
in flam ed	describes tissue which is red and swollen
in jec tion	liquid medication pushed into the body through a needle
in ter ior	relating to the inside or within
in ten sity	describes how strong something is
joint	place where two bones meet; joints assist with movement and flexibility
knuckle	part between small bones in the hand which help the fingers move easily
lateral	on the side of the body, furthest from the midline
lid	covering of a container
(to) limp	abnormal gait whereby a person dips to one side when walking
lum bar	medical term which describes the <i>loins</i> (part of the body between the ribs and the hips)
lum ba go	pain in the lower back resulting from muscle strain
mild pain	pain which is not very strong
moderate pain	quite a lot of pain, so it is hard to move around
(to) mon itor	to check a condition frequently, so that deterioration in the condition is managed
mor phine	an opioid drug or very strong painkiller
muscle	bundle of cells which contract to produce movement
mus cular	relating to the muscles
nagging pain	pain which is constant and won't go away
nape of the neck	medical term <i>nucha;</i> lower part of the neck
nausea	feeling that you need to vomit
newborn	also called <i>neonate;</i> a baby just after birth
non-ste roi dal anti- in flamm atory drugs (NSAIDs)	class of drugs that reduce pain, decrease fever and reduce inflammation
nu cha	medical term which describes the nape of the neck
nuchal	relating to the nucha or nape of the neck





	nain anala which was a number from 0 to 10 to indicate nain
nu mer ical scale	pain scale which uses numbers from 0 to 10 to indicate pain severity
oc ciput	medical term for back of the head
oc cip ital	relating to the occiput or back of the head
olecranon process	medical term for <i>elbow</i>
o pioid	class of drugs which have morphine-like effects
os teoarthritis	often shortened to <i>arthritis</i> , condition where the joints of the body become painfully inflamed
pain le vel	amount of pain a person has
pain ful	describes something which hurts a lot and is sore
pain killer	medication which helps to stop pain
pain re lief	medical term analgesia
pain scale	scale usually numbered zero to ten which patients use to allocate a number to describe their pain level
pain se ver ity	measure of how painful something is
pa tell a	medical term for kneecap, a flat triangle-shaped bone in front of the knee
patient controlled analgesia (PCA)	strong painkillers which are delivered to patients intravenously, whenever patients press a button attached to the IV line
pharmacy	chemist or place where medication is prepared or sold
pharynx	medical term for <i>throat</i> , section of the gastrointestinal tract from the mouth and nasal cavity to the larynx (voice box)
popli te al	medical term which describes the knee
popliteal fossa	medical term for the kneepit or back of the knee
prem ature	baby who is born early, i.e. before 40 weeks of gestation
Premature Infant Pain Profile (PIPP)	chart of the changes in facial expressions in a premature infant which indicate the presence of pain
(to) pre scribe	write an order for a drug or IV fluids on a drug chart or prescription form
pubes	medical term for the lower part of the abdomen over the reproductive organs
pubic	relating to the <i>pubes</i>





(to) pulsate / pulsating	to throb or beat in the same way as a heartbeat
que asy	feeling sick as if you want to vomit
(to) rate pain	match a number to how bad the pain is
ref erred pain	pain felt away from the injury
se vere pain	pain which is intense and makes you cry out
sharp pain	intense stabbing pain
shoulder blade	medical term scapula
side effect	an unpleasant effect of a drug that happens in addition to the main effect and which is unintended
(a) sore	also called a wound or lesion; injury to the skin
sore	see painful
spine	rigid bony structure in the middle of the back
stabbing pain	pain which feels like being cut by a knife
stiff	describes something which does not move easily
stomach ache	pain in the stomach or abdomen
sub jec tive	something experienced by a person, e.g. a feeling or a symptom
sup pos itory	a small, solid type of medication that is put inside the anus, where it dissolves easily
(to) swell	to expand or get bigger
swollen	refers to something which is distended or increased in size, e.g. swollen finger
tablet	a small, solid type of medicine taken by mouth
ten der	sensitive or painful to the touch
thigh	part of the body above the knee
toothache	soreness or pain around a tooth
thorax	Medical term meaning <i>chest</i> . Part of the body between the neck and the abdomen.
throbbing pain	pain which makes you feel that you can feel the blood flowing through your blood vessels
tummy	everyday term for abdomen
um bil icus	medical term for <i>navel</i>
ver bal	describes using words



vertebra (plural: vertebrae)	Medical term meaning bony segment of the spine. There are 33 vertebrae in the adult spine.
vis ual	describes things which are seen
(to) vom it	to expel undigested or partly digested food from the stomach out of the mouth
vom iting	medical term <i>emesis</i> or <i>vomitus</i> ; process of ejecting undigested or partially digested food from the stomach out of the mouth
walking aid	Also called <i>mobility aid</i> . Device used to provide stability for a person who has an unsteady gait, e.g. walking frame, rollator, crutches.
Wong Ba ker Fac es	pain scale which uses ten different facial expressions to indicate pain severity
